**Session 1:** Italy experienced the largest voluntary migration in documented history, from the 1861 to 1914, when more than 9 million people left Italy. Almost half migrated to the US. Why did they leave Italy?

Session 2: From 1880 through 1920 more than 20 million immigrants arrived in the US during a time that parallels today. Most entered the US through Ellis Island, NY and passed inspections before entering. What was the experience like? How were the immigrants treated when they arrived? Where did they settle?

**Session 3:** Today Italians number 17.4 million and are the 7<sup>th</sup> largest ancestry group in the US. What are their cultural traditions? Why is ancestry research so popular? What are some of the emotional and intellectual rewards of understanding your origins?

Bringing the immigrant story full circle, recovering lost history, sharing hard-earned practical wisdom.
